

## CHAMPIONS CUP



The Europa Cup, with the support of PHILIP MORRIS, was held for the first time in 1979. It was conceived as a competition between the national club *champions* of all EBL member countries. Countries were placed in regional qualifying heats, from which the winners went on to the European final. The event suffered because many countries that do not hold inter-club competitions simply sent their *national teams* instead. This created an uneven playing field and defeated the purpose of the event, which was ultimately discontinued after 1988.





25 October 2002 on the initiative of EBL, with support from the Polish Federation and the CA-IB Bank, the concept was revived, in a different format, with the introduction of the European Champions' Cup, given to winners of national team championships of the eight nations that have been classified in the first eight places European Team Championships.

Since 2004, the defending champions put their titles up for grabs each year and are challenged by the National Champions of the 10 countries classified in the last European Team Championships and a team representing the host country.
