




EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIPS SENIOR PAIRS

The first *European Senior Championship* was played in 1989 at the initiative of *Nissan Rand* with the unusual formula of 100 years in two. Were later imposed age limits for each player starting from 55 years and reaching the current 60.

During the Championships of Tenerife in 2001, the General Assembly and the Executive Committee of the European Federation have decided, starting in 2003, the restructuring of the *European Championships* in *European Pairs Championships* and *European Open Championships*.

As part of the *European Open Championships* held in odd years has included a *Transnational Senior Pairs Championships* allowed to an unlimited number of bridge players freely composed and from all over the world.
