

## EUROPEAN UNIVERSITY BRIDGE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The European University Championships are open to all European Universities and High Schools may submit an unlimited number of teams of 4 / 6 players (non-playing captain more) provided at least two players belong to the same university or school. All players of a team but must have the same nationality.





The championships usually take place and since their first edition in a designated City of Culture for the year of progress and, in 1995, were not played due to the fact that the city was named the culture of that year that Luxembourg has its own university.

The event is in fact a Championship Team Open University for Nations, was created in 1993 for an initiative of the University of Antwerp, which was already a sponsor of the chess champion, was initially held once a year and, since 1999 under the auspices of the European Bridge League, only in odd years alternatively, to peers, the University World Cup.

Since February 2003 the European University Sports Association has decided to annex the European University Bridge Championships, giving them the name of European Universities Bridge Cup for the EUSA Championships in 2007 and subsequent ones.

Starting with the 2009, the EUSA added a tender closing Transnational Pairs which students can also participate as part of National Teams.
