

WORLD BRIDGE SERIES MIXED PAIRS

The first editions of the European/World Mixed Pairs Championships were played in a non-official way and many of them have lost track. The first ever World Pairs Championship can be seen as the one organized by the legendary Ely Culbertson in 1932 under the name "World Bridge Olympic" which was won by the Norwegians outsider: Isak Nielsen and Otto Krefthing.

1937 in Budapest during the European/World championships a Mixed Pairs Championship was organized which may be regarded as the first World Mixed Pairs Championship.





The first World Pairs Championships organized by the WBF had the characteristic of an Olympiad and was held in Cannes in 1962 for only three categories: Open and Women Pairs and Mixed Teams.

The Team Championship was repeated in 1974 and then from 1996 moved into the Olympic games.

In 1966 was Mixed Pairs was added and in 1978 the *Rosenblum Cup* was born.

In 1990 the Senior Category was introduced and in 1994 the *Mc Connell Cup* joined.

Today, each even non-leap year, the World Bridge Federation is organizing the World Pairs Championships for every category, often accompanied by ancillary events that engage players eliminated in the final stages.




